# From the Executive Director - Bob Mahar

*Thanks to all of you who are already in the CAR*

Summer can often be a slow, quiet time with vacations, kids home from school, and long days. At LVR traffic in our library, computer use and workshops do slow down a bit, but many other things keep us busy around the office. Summer is also a time for counting – counting all our learners and volunteers and their hours, achievements and gains.

As we begin our fall workshops we are starting a new education process called CAR. CAR stands for Contact Hours,



Assessment and Reporting. We are informing our tutor trainees that we need them to report their contact hours on quarterly and annual reports and to encourage their learners to come in for annual assessments. We also need them to complete their annual reports, sent each spring, to document student achievements.

Over the last several years, you have heard staff and volunteers talk more about the importance of reporting. The information is critical, not just for funding, but to enable us to document the work that learners and volunteers are doing and the impact it is having on lives. In the enclosed annual report, you will see that our learner achievements topped 2,200 this year. Also of note is

that NRS (National Reporting System) educational gains increased by over 70%. These numbers are a direct result of the contributions of learners and volunteers: more than 75% of annual reports were received, 80% of learners returned for their annual assessments, and more than 20,000 volunteer hours were documented again this year.

My thanks to all of you – learners and volunteers (tutors as well as many administrative volunteers including pre-viewers, interviewers, trainers, outreach callers and data entry) as well as LVR staff who worked hard to put these systems in place. You are all certainly in the LVR CAR, and helping it to move forward, as we show the community the fine work you are all doing.

Despite being late to the Harry Potter reading craze (I hadn't begun the series until this past winter), I was nonetheless standing in line at the East Avenue Wegmans, at midnight, waiting to purchase two copies (one for my wife and one for me) of the seventh and final Harry Potter installment. The Big Read is a national initiative of the National Endowment for the Arts designed to help reestablish reading for pleasure and enlightenment as a core American value. The Big Read provides citizens with the opportunity to read and discuss a single book. Nearly 200 communities participating across the country will read one of twelve classic American novels (the full list can be found at [www.neabigread.com](http://www.neabigread.com)).

Writers & Books, Rochester's community literary center, is the community organization that was selected by the Arts Endowment to lead our local participation because of the quality of outlined plans to develop and implement a community-wide reading program and the ability to reach and engage new and diverse audiences. Writers & Books will sponsor readings, lectures, book discussions, classes, writing and filmmaking contests, films, panel discussions, and special events across the region throughout October and November.

I encourage you to check out the Writers & Books web site to review some of their plans and events for The Big Read at [www.wab.org](http://www.wab.org).

And so, without further ado, the Rochester selection for the Big Read is Dashiell Hammett's 1930 classic, *The Maltese Falcon*. The Arts Endowment web site declares that this novel, Hammett's third, sets the standard by which all subsequent detective fiction is judged and that "Hammett's clean prose and sharp ear for dialogue produced an exceedingly readable novel with enough twists to keep the reader turning the pages in search of clues."

I look forward to The Big Read for several reasons: I think this is truly a worthy project (indeed, many of LVR's tutors become a tutor simply because of their love for reading); I have neither read the book nor seen the movie; and lastly, this should be fun. So, just as it was with the Harry Potter books, I beseech you not to spoil the ending for me if you happen to see me before I finish the book. And if you feel compelled to talk about *The Maltese Falcon*, The Big Read will provide lots of opportunities for you.
